Course Description

This course is designed to guide undergraduates in adjusting to the academic, social, and cultural life of the University of Kentucky. Student Learning Outcomes

Through lectures, discussions, exercises, and out-of-class assignments, UK 101 helps students reach the student learning outcomes listed below.

As a result of UK 101, students will:

- 1. Identify and pursue avenues and activities to engage with the University of Kentucky community.
- 2. Describe and evaluate their new collegiate learning environment and how to utilize campus resources to aid academic success and personal growth.
- 3. Recognize personal and social issues (e.g., alcohol, health and wellness, financial wellness), articulate healthy behaviors, and identify strategies to address these issues.
- 4. Examine individual backgrounds and experiences and recognize the value of engaging in a diverse community.

Course Format

- Class will be held in-person two days each week for 50 minutes.
- You are expected to be fully present and on time for each class session. Attendance is required.

Peer Instructor

Course instruction is led by your Primary Instructor and Peer Instructor. Peer Instructors are undergraduate students who recently successfully completed UK 101 and have now taken on this leadership role in order to support first year students' successful transition to UK. Peer Instructors will aid in facilitating lessons, activities in class, and assistance in completing assignments. Peer Instructors will be available to meet outside of class to work on assignments and support you in your first semester and beyond. While they will be familiar with all assignments and ready to help you be in successful in class, they will not grade assignments or have access to your grades.

Engagement/participation activities

Each class session will include an exercise or activity that asks you to think critically and/or practice a student success skill. These activities are designed to promote active learning and engagement with your classmates. Earning these activity points necessities your attendance in class each week. Excused absences with documentation provided within one week of the absence will allow a student to make up these points.

Quizzes

Every other week students will complete a quiz that evaluates their knowledge and engagement with the course material covered that week.

Explore UK

A key part of being a successful Wildcat is learning how to navigate campus, which includes everything from dining to classrooms to tutoring centers and so much more! Each week students are asked to explore a space, program, event, resource, office, etc. that is new to them. This can either be a digital or in-person exploration. Then, students will post a picture (screen shot or selfie) to the Canvas assignment and provide a description of where they went, why they chose that space, what did they learn about it, and why it is important for students to know about.

Faculty/Staff Office Hours

Developing positive relationships with faculty has a lasting impact on students' lives. This assignment asks students to identify one of their instructors and attend their office hours (in-person or virtual). This meeting is an opportunity to clarify expectations for their class, determine communication preferences, strategies for success in the class, and a deeper understanding of the course material and discipline knowledge. Students will provide feedback about their meeting for this assignment.

Handshake exercise

Students will log into the Stuckert Career Center's Handshake platform (https://uky.joinhandshake.com/login) to explore employment and internship opportunities. In this exercise we ask that students identify a job or internship that they envision themselves applying for in the future. Then, they will describe what knowledge, skills, and experiences they need to gain in order to be a qualified candidate.

Reflection papers

How's It Going – students will write 1-2 pages evaluating their first 3 weeks of the semester with particular emphasis on comparing what they expected college to be like and what the reality is. They are also asked to describe what study strategies have been working well and what academic challenges they have faced.

Identity and Community Building – students will write 1-2 pages describing their feelings and reaction to the identity and inclusion lessons they participated in. They will describe goals for their own growth and contribution to fostering an inclusive and diverse Wildcat community.

End of Semester – students will write 1-2 pages reflecting on what their key takeaways in UK 101 are and how they plan to implement them moving forward.

Grading Scale

Attendance and Academic Policies

Students are expected to be present and actively engaged in the classroom. Actively engaged looks like showing up to class on time, completing homework and assignments on time, and asking questions and participating in class activities.

Make-up Work

Students missing any graded work due to an excused absence are responsible for: informing their instructor about their excused absence within one week following the period of the excused absence (except where prior notification is required); and for making up the missed work. The instructor must give the student an opportunity to make up the work and/or the exams missed due to the excused absence, and shall do so, if feasible, during the semester in which the absence occurred. The instructor shall provide the student with an opportunity to make up the graded work and may not simply calculate the student's grade on the basis of the other course requirements, unless the student agrees in writing.

Excused Absences and Acceptable Excuses

Senate Rules 5.2.5.2.1 defines the following as acceptable reasons for excused absences: (a) significant illness, (b) death of a family member, (c) trips for members of student organizations sponsored by an educational unit, trips for University classes, and trips for participation in intercollegiate athletic events, (d) major religious holidays, (e) interviews for graduate/professional school or full-time employment post-graduation, and (f) other circumstances found to fit "reasonable cause for nonattendance" by the instructor of record. Students should notify the professor of absences prior to class when possible.

If a course syllabus requires specific interactions (e.g., with the instructor or other students), in situations where a student's total EXCUSED absences exceed 1/5 (or 20%) of the required interactions for the course, the student shall have the right to request and receive a "W," or the Instructor of Record may award an "I" for the course if the student declines a "W." (Senate Rules 5.2.5.2.3.1)

Verification of Absences

Students may be asked to verify their absences in order for them to be considered excused. Senate Rule 5.2.5.2.1 states that faculty have the right to request appropriate verification when students claim an excused absence due to: significant illness; death in the household, trips for classes, trips sponsored by an educational unit and trips for participation related to intercollegiate athletic events; and interviews for full-time job opportunities after graduation and interviews for graduate and professional school. (Appropriate notification of absences due to University-related trips is required prior to the absence when feasible and in no case more than one week after the absence.)

Assignment Policies

All assignments are expected to be submitted via Canvas in the format described on the Canvas assignment.

Late Assignments

Assignments submitted after the deadline will be accepted with a deduction in points. A 10% point deduction will be applied if turned in within a week after the due date and 25% point deduction after 2 weeks, with a maximum deduction of 40% for work turned in after 3 weeks.

Academic Offenses (Cheating, Plagiarism, and Falsification or Misuse of Academic Records)

Per University policy, students shall not plagiarize, cheat, or falsify or misuse academic records. Students are expected to adhere to University policy on cheating and plagiarism in all courses. The minimum penalty for a first offense is a zero on the assignment on which the offense occurred. If the offense is considered severe or the student has other academic offenses on their record, more serious penalties, up to suspension from the University, may be imposed.

Plagiarism and cheating are serious breaches of academic conduct. Each student is advised to become familiar with the various forms of academic dishonesty as explained in the University Bulletin and the Student Code of Conduct. Complete information can be found at the following website: Rules Regarding Academic Offenses. A plea of ignorance is not acceptable as a defense against the charge of academic dishonesty. It is important that you review this information as all ideas borrowed from others need to be properly credited.

Senate Rule 6.3.1 (see <u>Senate Rules</u> for the current set of Senate Rules) states that all academic work, written or otherwise, submitted by students to their instructors or other academic supervisors, is expected to be the result of their own thought, research, or self-expression. In cases where students feel unsure about a question of plagiarism involving their work, they are obliged to consult their instructors on the matter before submission.

When students submit work purporting to be their own, but which in any way borrows ideas, organization, wording, or content from another source without appropriate acknowledgment of the fact, the students are guilty of plagiarism.

Plagiarism includes reproducing someone else's work (including, but not limited to a published article, a book, a website, computer code, or a paper from a friend) without clear attribution. Plagiarism also includes the practice of employing or allowing another person to alter or revise the work, which a student submits as their own, whoever that other person may be. Students may discuss assignments among themselves or with an instructor or tutor, but when the actual work is done, it must be done by the student, and the student alone.

When a student's assignment involves research in outside sources or outside information, the student must carefully acknowledge exactly what, where, and how they have employed them. If the words of someone else are used, the student must put quotation marks around the passage in question and add an appropriate indication of its origin. Making simple changes while leaving the organization, content, and phraseology intact is plagiaristic. However, nothing in these Rules shall apply to those ideas, which are so generally and freely circulated as to be a part of the public domain.

Please note: Any assignment you turn in may be submitted to an electronic database to check for plagiarism.
